# OUR ACTION IN Burundi

### Supporting the Education sector

Since 2005, Burundi has made education, a recognized vector for peace and equal opportunities, and a political and budgetary priority. AFD Bujumbura has been involved in this sector since 2006.

Although the goal of universal access to primary education has been achieved, the education system still hides significant disparities. To overcome these challenges, the Ministry of Education, Technical and Vocational Training has embarked on a process of structural reform aimed at consolidating and strengthening the system's achievements.

Despite the impact of the 2015 crisis on the country, national authorities and sectoral partners jointly developed an Education Transitional Plan (ETP) for 2018-2020, with the support of UNICEF as the coordinating agency. This plan aims to respond to the challenges facing the sector, driven by the reform of basic education.

Today, the authorities are preparing to embark on a new long-term planning cycle. Thanks the efforts and the progress made, Burundi has been able to benefit from financing from the Global Education Partnership in the amount of USD 25.6 million, supported by co-financing from AFD's own funds of EUR 4 million, which will be implemented over the next four years. In 2015, AFD was designated in 2015 as "Partner Agent" for the TWIGE NEZA program by the government. The latter has renewed its confidence in us for an additional allocation of 21.3 MUSD, which is currently being studied for a target allocation in 2020 for supporting new concrete measures to improve education conditions for Burundian children.
