In 2022, fragile contexts are home to 24% of the world's population.⁽¹⁾

A scrises have become longer and more complex, AFD Group has made sustainable peace a key priority, alongside climate and social cohesion. France's "Prevention, Resilience and Sustainable Peace" strategy, which aims at addressing state and societal fragility provides a framework to build a collective commitment towards achieving sustainable peace, using the complementary resources of Team France in the areas of diplomacy, defense, development, stabilization, and humanitarian action.

Launched in 2017, the Minka Peace and Resilience Fund supports projects addressing the root causes of crises and conflicts in response to the needs of the most vulnerable populations. Managed by AFD, the Fund aims at providing medium and long-term financial support to projects, in regions affected by crises or violent conflicts. Minka projects support conflict prevention and peacebuilding efforts before, during and after crises with the aim of adopting a humanitarian-development-peace nexus approach. In line with France's key foreign policy priorities, Minka covers four crises areas: the Sahel region, the Lake Chad region, the Central African Republic and the Middle East.

In 2022, AFD faced multiple challenges in the four above-mentioned areas: political instability, a deteriorating security situation (especially in the Sahel region) rising inflation, and climate change as a threat multiplier. These challenges highlight the need for increased cooperation and coordination among development partners to meet growing community needs. To help address the consequences of these crises, AFD has made the financing of projects providing long-term support to the most vulnerable populations (marginalized groups, women, youth, refugees, forcibly displaced persons and host populations) a priority for 2022, in partnership with actors that are well-established at the local level.

Leading projects with the Minka Fund



Why?

To support **peacebuilding**, in line with Sustainable Development Goal 16 and with France's foreign policy priorities.



With whom? The Minka Fund finances projects led by governments, civil society organizations, as well as private actors.



How?

By financing projects, which respond to the needs of local populations on the ground, with the aim of fostering social cohesion and restoring trust between governments and citizens. These projects are part of a multisectoral and regional approach.



For whom?

Helping the most **vulnerable populations**, by prioritizing initiatives promoting inclusion, with a focus on youth, gender equality, displaced people and marginalized groups.



When?

Taking action **before**, **during and after a crisis/conflict** to adress the root causes that lead to violence and to support more resilient and more cohesive societies.



Where?

Minka project are carried out within a regional framework, in line with France's four priority crisis areas:

- Minka Sahel Initiative
- Minka Lake Chad Initiative
- Minka Minka Central African Republic Initiative
- ス Minka Middle East Initiative

Minka Lake Chad Initiative

CAMEROON, NIGER, NIGERIA AND CHAD

The situation in the Lake Chad basin continues to worsen, but funding remains insufficient to cover the needs of local communities⁵ With over 11 million people in need of humanitarian assistance⁶, 5 million displaced people⁷ and 1,038 schools closed, the region is mired in a cross-border, multi-dimensional and prolonged armed conflict, responsible for one of the most serious and oldest crisis in the world. Since 2017, AFD has granted over €100 M to fund 13 projects that contribute to child protection, women empowerment, essential services, and food system resilience for conflict-affected communities. The Minka Lake Chad Initiative provides tangible support to nearly 1.5 million people in Chad, Niger, Cameroon and Nigeria (Diffa, Chétimaria, Bol, Bagasola, Banki, Mora, etc.), in line with the commitments made by France at the Conference on the Lake Chad Region, (Niamey, January 2023).

FEATURED PROJECT: CROSS-BORDER PROJECT FOR ECONOMIC RECOVERY AND ACCESS TO ESSENTIAL SERVICES (<u>RESILAC 2</u>)

New phase, with a fresh investment of €38 M co-financed by the European Union and led by a consortium of NGOs in the Lake Chad Basin.

➡ Main goal: create an environment conducive to economic recovery, resilience and social cohesion in the areas most affected by the Lake Chad crisis and the adverse impact of climate change on local communities.

Minka Middle East Initiative

LEBANON, JORDAN, IRAQ AND TURKEY

Facing the cumulative effects of climate change, declining biodiversity and armed conflicts, the Middle East is experiencing a multi-faceted crisis that exacerbates the humanitarian needs of the population. In 2023, there were an estimated 6.7 million registered Syrian refugees in Iraq, Jordan, Lebanon and Turkey, in urgent need of humanitarian aid.⁸ While Jordan and Iraq show some relative stability despite serious inequalities between and within displaced populations and host populations, Lebanon has been plunged into a multi-dimensional crisis with acute humanitarian impacts. Indeed, 30 years after the last reported case, Lebanon had to face a new cholera outbreak in 2022, with over 4.000 registered cases. As the socio-economic crisis worsens, AFD has granted €62 M from the Minka Fund⁹ to this area, with a focus on the healthcare, agricultural and education sectors.

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FEATURED PROJECT: SUPPORT TO LEBANESE CIVIL SOCIETY ORGANIZATIONS, FOR A LOCAL RESPONSE TO CRISES

SHABAKE project (phase 2) in Lebanon, implemented by Expertise France – launched in 2019 – €10 M from AFD and €2.2 M from the Crisis and Support Center, granted in 2022.

Main goal: foster social cohesion, peace and stability by accompanying local SCOs providing support to Syrian refugees and vulnerable host communities in Lebanon.

Minka CAR Initiative

CENTRAL AFRICAN REPUBLIC (CAR)

The Central African Republic is plunged into an ever-deepening cycle of violence and insecurity, fueled by a protracted political crisis. With 1.2 million displaced people¹⁰, and 2.2 million people suffering from food insecurity¹¹, over half of the Central African population is in need of humanitarian assistance¹². There is no clear path out of the crisis, with strong impacts on foreign investment and on the country's development perspectives. Indeed, in 2022, France decided to gradually withdraw its official development assistance from CAR amid deteriorating bilateral relations. AFD will continue to implement ongoing projects that directly benefit the Central African Republic population, but will not grant any additional funding. Between 2017 and 2022, AFD has invested €85 M in projects supporting over 1 million vulnerable people.

FEATURED PROJECT: SUPPORT FOR FEMINIST ORGANIZATIONS CONTRIBUTING TO THE "WOMEN, PEACE AND SECURITY" AGENDA

A "Women, Peace and Security" call for projects was launched in three priority crises areas for France in 2022¹³: €3 M were granted to a consortium of local CSOs in Central Africa (Central African Republic, Cameroon and Democratic Republic of Congo).

Main goal: implement a program for funding, capacity building and networking dedicated to feminist organizations whose work focuses on the "Women, Peace and Security" agenda.

Minka Sahel Initiative

BURKINA FASO, MALI, MAURITANIA, NIGER AND CHAD

The security and political situation in Central Sahel has been deteriorating significantly, threatening to destabilize coastal countries (Senegal and the Gulf of Guinea). With over 3 million internally displaced people,¹⁴ 2.7 million people suffering from food insecurity¹⁵ and 8.000 schools closed,¹⁶ humanitarian needs continue to rise and yet international cooperation funding remains insufficient.¹⁷ Moreover, in 2022, the French armed forces in the Sahel region were re-structured and France suspended its official development assistance following the coup in Mali. Despite these challenges, the Minka Sahel Initiative pursues its commitment to provide long-term support to improve human security, with a record €148 M granted in 2022. Thanks to a solid, longstanding partnership network, and a comprehensive approach combining humanitarian and development efforts, AFD supports 35 partners (governments, local authorities, NGOs, civil society) that work to implement Minka Sahel funding that will benefit approximately 2 million people over the next four years.

FEATURED PROJECT: DEVELOPING INCLUSIVE WELCOME AREAS FOR REFUGEES IN EAST CHAD (DIZA / RESPECCT)

Phase 2 of the project (2023-2025) implemented by a consortium of international NGOs - €11 M AFD grant and €10 M European Union grant.

➡ Main goal: building community resilience and fostering social cohesion in border zones of Sudan (Sila, Ouaddaï, Wadi Fira) which are facing climate hazards and severe challenges in absorbing forced displacements (280,000 new refugees in June). Entering this new phase, humanitarian donors will be able to provide co-funding to help mitigate the impacts of the conflict in Sudan.

Prospects for 2023

2023 will be dedicated to the renewal of the Minka Peace and Resilience Fund to better understand conflict dynamics, to build effective crisis response strategies, and to adapt to new diplomatic contexts. In order to tackle the challenges of current and future crises, the Minka Fund must rethink its intervention logic, geographic scope and governance structure.

In 2022, six years after the Minka Fund was launched, an independent consulting firm conducted its evaluation. This assessment confirmed the relevance of an approach based on an in-depth analysis of the root causes of conflicts and the use of flexible procedures in crises areas¹⁸. The evaluation also outlined recommendations to help Minka achieve its main goal: fostering **peacebuilding**. In 2023, AFD teams will pursue their efforts to operationalize these recommendations, with a specific focus on adopting a conflict-sensitive approach in all Minka projects.

With over 339 million people in need of humanitarian assistance in 2023,¹⁹ the global objective of ending extreme poverty by 2030 seems increasingly difficult to reach.²⁰ In this context, the Minka Fund will renew its commitment to the fight against vulnerabilities and step up its efforts to strengthen the resilience of communities in need. For instance, the DIZA program, dedicated to improving the living conditions and resilience of local communities, refugees and returnees in three provinces in Southern Chad, will be renewed, with a specific focus on the challenges that women face.

In 2023, AFD will also pursue its efforts to promote women's rights and address gender inequalities in crises and conflict areas. Indeed, AFD stands out as a key actor in the implementation of France's third "Women, Peace, Security" National Action Plan 2021-2025. In line with this commitment, Minka places great emphasis on ensuring that the four pillars of this agenda are a priority in every project that the Fund supports: (i) prevention, protection and the fight against violence; (ii) promotion of women's participation in decisions regarding peace and security; (iii) support for gender equality by implementing concrete initiatives to benefit women; (iv) promotion of structural actions for the "Women, Peace and Security" agenda. For instance, a €10 M call for projects dedicated to supporting local feminist CSOs that are actively working towards the "Women, Peace and Security" agenda in the Sahel region, Central Africa and the Middle East was launched. Furthermore, 2022 was a turning point : 100% of the annual Minka funding was allocated to gender equality projects (DAC 1&2), demonstrating AFD's steadfast commitment to adressing gender issues in crises and conflict situations. Building on these achievements, in 2023, AFD will finalize a study on how to adopt an intersectional approach to gender and conflict in all future Minka projects. This study is carried out by an independent consultancy firm and highlights priority goals for the coming years: systematically structure Minka projects around intervention logics that combine gender and conflict issues, prioritize DAC 2 projects that support the implementation of the "Women, Peace and Security" agenda, engage with men and masculinities in conflict-affected settings, provide gender-sensitive trainings to AFD agents, and mainstream gender in project-cycle management as well as impact measurement.

In line with AFD's commitment to adopting a conflict prevention approach, the Minka Fund will seek to support projects in the northern regions of the Gulf of Guinea, as terrorists groups in the Sahel region increasingly threaten Gulf of Guinea states. Eastern Senegal will also be a key priority area, with a project focusing on social cohesion in the Kédougou region.
