6 CLEAN WATER AND SANITATION



espite an international situation that continues to be particularly uncertain, especially in the Sahel, AFD Group's activity in the water and sanitation sector reached unprecedented levels in 2023. The Group's work was boosted notably by its subsidiary, Proparco.

2023 was marked by a renewal of the international governance of the sector through the UN Water Conference, the first since 1977! AFD actively contributed through its participation in the launch of the Team Europe initiative on Transboundary Water Management in Africa, which it spearheaded. It also coordinated the Joint Declaration of Water Ministers from Sahelian Countries, together with the World Health Organization (WHO) and Sanitation and Water for All (SWA). In addition, the Group promoted the crucial role of Public Development Banks through the Water Finance Coalition, as well as the integration of Nature-based solutions into infrastructure projects, in partnership with The Nature Conservancy (TNC).

This annual activity review reports on the results of AFD Group's operations, both those estimated when new financing is approved and those carried out in 2023 through the implementation of ongoing projects.

These results are presented on the basis of their contribution to the achievement of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). They demonstrate the transversal nature of this sector, which can help meet a number of the SDG targets, well beyond SDG n° 6 dedicated to the water and sanitation sector.

This report also serves as a tool to monitor the Group's water and sanitation objectives until 2025.

## Examples of new projects financed in 2023

### **Q** Brazil

### Water and sanitation for 10 million Brazilians

To achieve the national targets of a 99% coverage for drinking water and 90% for sanitation in 2033, the concessionaires Águas do Rio 1 and 4 are investing in the rehabilitation and extension of sanitation and water distribution infrastructure in 27 municipalities of the State of Rio de Janeiro. By increasing the volume of treated wastewater, the project is contributing to the depollution of Guanabara Bay. It benefits from a loan from IDB in local currency (R\$1.5 billion/\$300 million), partly guaranteed by Proparco.

### Addressing the challenge of menstrual health and hygiene (MHH)

MHH is faced with three barriers: a lack of information on a subject that is often taboo, the inaccessibility of sanitary products, and a lack of suitable sanitation facilities. To help remove these barriers, AFD is supporting around a hundred local feminist civil society organizations working to protect women's rights in nine countries, including five in Africa. It is also supporting about 30 social and solidaritybased enterprises, which are essential in securing the market for menstrual hygiene products.

### **Q** India

#### Promoting more climate-resilient cities

AFD is supporting a call for projects for municipalities led by the Indian Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs. About 20 projects, selected for their contribution to climate resilience, will be financed. They will stand out for their contribution to efficient water and sanitation service management, wastewater reuse, and water resource preservation. They will range from the construction of infrastructure and capacity building for operators, to sectoral reform.

### • Mauritius A transformational sector reform

In Mauritius, the drinking water service is only partially provided and only 19% of wastewater is treated, while water resources are stretched and extreme natural events are increasing in intensity. These issues call for a structural reform, which AFD is financing. A National Integrated Water Resources Management (IWRM) Plan is in preparation. It aims to increase drinking water production, multiply sewerage network connections, and reduce leakage.

## Partnerships for greater impact on the ground

AFD Group supports initiatives to **address the lack of financing for the water and sanitation sector.** 



#### Water Finance Coalition

The Coalition gathers Public Development Banks aiming to improve the financing of the water and sanitation sector. It provides a space for experience sharing and has been offering technical assistance to national and regional banks since 2023. The objective is to create a roadmap for them to increase their financing in this sector.



#### Sahel Declaration

During the UN Water Conference in March 2023, the Sahelian States, the members of the Sahel Alliance and WHO signed a joint declaration reiterating the need for strong commitments for the sector. This has resulted in an action plan to step up the exchange of experience between countries. It is being implemented with support from SWA, WHO and AFD.

### CityWide Inclusive Sanitation (CWIS) with the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation

CWIS approaches are more decentralized and require less infrastructure. They often offer a more effective solution for addressing the challenge of universal access to sanitation in cities of the Global South, which have been expanding rapidly. An agreement was signed in 2023 for the delegation of €1.5 million of funds from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation for AFD to develop new technical, financial and socioeconomic methods and tools for all operators in the sector. The objective is to develop projects using these approaches.

#### Complementarity of network-based and off-grid services with GRET

The 7<sup>th</sup> ContrEauverses seminar, organized in September 2023, provided the opportunity to look at the new modes of governance developing alongside centralized and networkbased approaches. The discussions between practitioners and researchers focused on the role of small-scale private service providers and associations, the development of bottled water, and strategies to increase household drinking water connections in cities of the Global South.
